held at the Nellis Tavern as our first public event of the year. This show is the outgrowth of the annual Antique Quilt Shows that Donna


Reston has spearheaded for the past several years.

What's New at the Tavern

The first thing you will notice as you approach the Tavern is our newly redesigned and painted sign out front, compliments of member Mike White.

Inside, the kitchen now has a frame and Plexiglas cover over the wattle and daub in the northwest corner, and the tavern room sports new molding, thanks to Peter Kruppenbacher. Our good friend Skip Barshied has restored the upstairs doorframes with molding to match the original.

The windows in the east room, the 1815 addition, and the second-floor bedroom above it, have had UV protection film placed on each pane of glass. This will hopefully protect the remaining stencils and other artifacts so spec-




The ground floor rooms (cellar) have new lights and electrical outlets and are ready
